Strategic report to DEC June 2025

Meeting opened at 6:00 PM via zoom all members were present. Dennis Soppe, chairman Dave Rehbein Dick Hogan Bruce Ferbach Brian Ring Dwight Dinkla and John Derner

A number of issues were discussed

(1) Commission and committee responsibilities

The committee felt that we need to have a job description of what the Chr. Duties are.

We feel if we have a video it needs to be from 4:00 to 7:00 minutes long otherwise a paragraph or two with the description of the job. We feel we need to start at the department level before moving on to post levels. We are hoping that this will carry down to the post level. Each member will do a write up of chr. Joband then consolidate book form.

(2) Department legislative council

We discussed on how to make this stronger. We feel that every district commander should make contact with their legislative person in their district before the legislative session starts in January, during, and at the end of this session. We will ask legislative chairman Randy Johnson to make up a template that the district commanders and vice commanders can use in contacting they're legislators. Along with this all Commission and committee chairman and members will be asked to do the same thing. We need to contact our representatives so they know what we're trying to do to help veterans.

(3) Department liaison committee

We feel that the liaison committee must become stronger as we need well qualified people for that committee. One of the requirements is that they are well respected within their district and that they need to visit other posts to find qualified people to run for office. We will attempt to have a class at midwinter to let the blue caps know what is involved. If the members know what needs to be done it will strengthen our liaison committee.

(4) Building updates

We are still waiting to hear from our contractor on if and when he will do the updates to the doors. We have asked Randy to contact him and see where he is on this.

(5) Leadership school

Adjutant John stated that it was very well attended we had 25 to 27 new people there and he thought the program went very well.

Thank You

Report to Department Executive Committee for Membership

2025 was not a good year for membership. As I write this the Department is in 32nd place in the national standings. The National report shows us at 91.56% of our target of 34,665. When we include the DMS that do not count toward our goal we have 32,115 registered legionnaires. We still have 2,624 members who did not renew for 2025, despite our efforts.

Some of the factors that affected our renewal included a total of \$10 increase in dues, five dollars the Department raised last year and the five dollars that National raised July 1. Another factor I believe was the fact that a significant number of our posts in the department were underwater, that is that their stated dues were less than what was required for their obligation. This prohibited individual members from renewing online. We don't know how many people tried to renew online and because they couldn't, then didn't pay their dues. I do know that I received 30+ emails from people who tried to renew online but couldn't. They were of course referred to their individual Legion posts.

What we did this year to promote membership:

Promoted a lottery awarding \$250 to individuals that renewed prior to 31 December 2024.

Promoted a lottery awarding \$250 to posts reaching hundred percent by May 15.

Sent emails to all legionnaires when not renewed and had an email address in the system. This was two separate emails, one to post members and one to the 729 members. Part of that email included a suggestion for them to sign up for the electronic newsletter, approximately 50+ signed up for that. Metrics show that within five days 40% had opened that email.

We also changed the commander's membership tour to a three-day marathon where the vice commander was on the radio on nine separate stations promoting "Be The One". Evenings were spent at Legion posts where a significant number of legionnaires could be present. It is worth noting that seventh district held an impromptu meeting at the hotel where we stayed the first night and I felt we had more members at that activity than they had at the district meeting.

In summary I feel we need to better motivate our individual Legion posts to encourage the renewal of members currently in the post.

Legion Riders Committee Report to DEC June 21, 2025

The 2025 Riding season un underway. Legacy Rides are in the planning stages in many districts. Last year we delivered \$17,378.00 to the National Convention. For 2025 the goal is to continue to grow and exceed that amount to support the Veterans and Children's Foundation. Several Iowa Riders are registered and booked for the 2025 Legacy Ride. A nearly 3000 mile round trip is sure to provide challenges and experiences and we're looking forward to delivering the funds to the National Commander.

Overall, The Veterans Emergency Fund continues to be a focus for many Chapters. For 2025 I will encourage Chapters to support this fund as Iowans helping Iowa Veterans, as well as asking Chapters to continue to look around their own communities for areas that they can make a difference, and for those that need assistance.

New for 2025 is a publicly accessible Legion Riders Facebook presence. On the new Iowa Legion Riders Facebook page, you will see riders donating funds they have raised, escorting homecoming parades, honoring our fallen and at times forgotten veterans. They are actively supporting IVH, the American Legions Be the One, Boys State, and Oratorical programs both as leaders and as volunteers.

It is my intent again this year to challenge the chapters to make a difference in 2025. I would like each chapter to Choose one recurring local event to call their own, and do their best to bring the positivity and capability of the American Legion as an organization out to their community. I expect to look back at 2025 and report that we took the opportunity to showcase our dedication and our commitment to the American Legion and what it stands for.

Please continue to use the Riders however and wherever you can. Together we can begin and continue to make a difference.

D.E.C. Americanism Report Department Headquarters Des Moines, Iowa June 21,2025


Commander Ring Sr, Adjutant Derner, and guests, greetings from your Department Americanism Chairmen.

LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION REPORT TO THE

DEPT OF IOWA CONVENTION, JULY 18-20, 2025

Year In Review

Our American Legion, Dept of Iowa Veterans Service Office at 210 Walnut Street, Des Moines, in partnership with our County Veterans Service Offices are responsible for \$36 Million in monthly benefits (\$432 Million yearly) to Iowa Veterans with service related disabilities.

VA compensation is intended to improve the quality of life for a veteran suffering from service-connected injuries and illnesses. Our Veterans Service Officers literally "Change And Save Lives" on a daily basis. Well earned service connected disability compensations combat Veteran Suicide, Veteran Homeless and Childhood Hunger.

The American Legion, Department of Iowa 2025 Legislative Priority #1 is securing Funding for Veterans Service Organizations Representing Veterans with the Veterans Benefits Administration at the Federal Building. It has become more difficult for the VSOs to provide the needed level of assistance to veterans with claims for compensation from the VA due to reduced revenue of the organizations and the increasing number of claims for VA benefits. The appropriation in the form of matching grants would be used to increase the number of professional service officers supporting lowa's veterans and our county veterans service officers.

Priority #2

Veterans Treatment Courts. The American Legion urges the State of Iowa to establish and expand Veterans' Treatment Courts. Veterans' Treatment Courts are hybrid Drug Courts and Mental Health Courts and have evolved out of the growing need for a treatment court model designed specifically for justice-involved veterans to maximize efficiency and economize resources. Many veterans that enter the veterans' treatment courts are not aware of their federal, state, or county benefits, such as Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) benefits for compensation, pension and health care. Grouping veterans into a specific court docket significantly expedites access to veteran-specific resources, including benefits and treatment earned through military service, and provides options for treatment as opposed to incarceration.

Priority #3

Military Homeowners Assistance Program. The program continues to be marketed to Veterans even after the funds have been exhausted for the fiscal year and Veterans are placed on a waiting list. Shortly after the Legislative Session began on Jan 13, Governor Reynolds increased the fund by \$500,000 and it was placed in her budget for the coming year, bringing the total available funds to \$2.7 Million.

The American Legion, Department of Iowa Legislative Commission begun the process in making contacts at the Iowa State Capital well ahead of the January 13, 2025 Session. We had our first meeting with Governor Reynolds office Nov 18, 2024 and presented our Legislative Priorities.

Jan 22, 2025

Veterans Day at the Capitol. The Legislative Commission met with Senate Majority Leader Witver, Senate President Sinclair, Speaker of the House Grassley, House Leader Windschitl, House Minority Leader Konfrst and Senate Minority Leader Weiner. We were received well at all the meetings and all were in agreement our priorities were Veteran centered, presented well and needed.

There was a lot of discussion throughout the remainder of the session. Our Commission continued to follow HF 1000 through the legislative process. We knew going into session funding was going to be an issue - and it was. But on April 30, the House found funding. The House version of the Health and Human Services Budget included our VSO matching grant program bill language and funding! Negotiations on the Health and Human Services (HHS) budget continued through May 13. The House had our VSO matching grant program funding and the HF 1000 language in their HHS budget, but the Senate did not. Unfortunately, the money was not included in the final HHS budget after negotiations. The House passed the bill unanimously and had it in their budget, but the Senate was unwilling to move it in this tough budget year. This means the bill will still be alive next session and only have to go through the Senate. We have all interim to work the Senate on this issue. We need to start conversations on possibly putting together a public campaign on the issue and have local legion members get their Senators to sign a commitment to get the bill done. Let's all take a deep breath as this session comes to an end. HF 1000 should not be looked upon as a failure. We knew going in funding was going to be an issue. Look at it this way: It's not gone - it's delayed. We'll quickly regroup and hit it very early the next time around and get HF 1000 through the Senate.

I'd like to thank Commander Ring for opportunity to chair the Legislative Commission. Thank you to the Commission Members, our Dept Staff and everybody that helped us along the way. See you next session.

On march 27, 2025 met with IOWA CITY VA MEDICAL Public Affairs for site/ area update.

Currently VA Iowa City oversees fourteen Community Base Outreach Centers (CBOC).

"It is a great honor to be awarded the **Pathway to Excellence accreditation,"** said Andrea Hayes, the Associate Director for Patient Care Services at the Iowa City VA.

January 7,2025 Iowa City VA Medical Health Care System was joined by builder Covenant Construction and conducted a groundbreaking ceremony for an expansion of specialty service clinical space. One of the two new stories will have an entire floor be Women Services.

Decorah new CBOC, 1106 Military Blvd, Decorah, Iowa 52101 will be held an Open House on April 28. 2025 for the Community to view all the specialty services available for the area veterans and their family.

Burlington, Iowa gained access to new site for their CBOC at 1000 North Roosevelt Avenue, Burlington. Services included Telehealth Services, Family/Internal Medicine, Primary Care, Mental Health, Audiology, and Addiction/Substance Abuse

<u>DES MOINES VA MEDICAL</u>- Central Iowa- Serves six CBOCS, Carroll, Des Moines, Fort Dodge, Knoxville, Marshalltown and Mason City

Galesburg CBOC Spotlight

Galesburg staff have successfully moved into their new Community Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) location at 1090 W. Carl Sandburg Dr. Suite 100, Galesburg, IL where the old mall once stood.

The new clinic is 10,000 square feet more than the previous one, offering a more open waiting room, a larger physical therapy room, a larger lab, and more exam rooms, including telehealth. Some new specialties provided will include an eyeglasses station, a women's health exam room with an attached bathroom, and radiology. With more space, the clinic is hopeful to add more specialties to better serve the Veterans in the area. Another upgrade offered at the clinic to help improve healthcare visits for Veterans is the addition of a new audiology booth. Previously the clinic used a mobile van for audiology appointments. "It was nice to have, but it meant that our patients would have to go outside in the cold into a van and get

that service," said Clinic Coordinator Tammy Heap. "Now we have the booth inside the clinic, so we can save them from extra steps and bad weather."

The clinic staff is excited to be able to host different group activities in the new space, such as cooking and battlefield acupuncture, a sentiment shared by the patients. "The staff as a whole couldn't be more compassionate, caring, helpful, concerning, and kind," said one Veteran, "All medical facilities should use Galesburg VA as a model!" With other comments raving about how great the staff and experiences at the Galesburg VA are, it is not a shock that the CBOC has a trust score of 94.4%.

The clinic was named in honor of Lane A. Evans—a dedicated Marine Corps Veteran, and congressman for Illinois' 17th Congressional District. Mr. Evans was a passionate supporter of veterans' rights, and his dedication to our country and its heroes is evident in the mission and values of the new facility. During his tenure in Congress, Mr. Evans was instrumental in advancing legislation that provided critical support to Veterans affected by Agent Orange exposure and became a key figure in elevating national awareness around Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and traumatic brain injuries (TBI) among returning service members. Although Mr. Evans died on November 5, 2014, his commitment to advocacy still motivates initiatives aimed at improving care for our country's Veteran

CBOC Spotlight: Waterloo VA Clinic

The Waterloo Community-Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) provides a range of services to Veterans, including audiology, optometry, radiology, physical therapy, primary care, and mental health.

Tom, a Veteran sitting in the waiting room, says he appreciates the convenience of not having to travel to Iowa City for his appointments. Other Veterans have shared their appreciation for the staff saying, "My experiences while utilizing the services of the Waterloo VA Clinic have been very positive. I would go so far as to say, that it was always outstanding, and I would highly recommend them to any veteran and all veterans residing locally needing care. Everyone I encountered while visiting the clinic was always very personable and professional while being knowledgeable and willing to help."

When reading through the positive comments patients have left regarding their experience at the Waterloo VA Clinic it is understandable how the CBOC has earned a V-Signal Trust score of 95.6, outperforming the National score by 4.1%. "My doctor is very thorough, knowledgeable, and is always very attentive to my needs," said one Veteran. "I was very impressed with all the staff and particularly the great facility. As a veteran of 32 years, I was given the best care."

A new service the clinic now offers is their Mobile Prosthetic and Orthotic Care (MoPOC). The van will be used as a production area to modify Veteran prostheses or orthoses. This initiative aims to provide better care to Veterans in the areas of Waterloo, Dubuque, and Ottumwa Clinics. When a provider determines their patient needs this service, they will request a consult at one of the clinics and schedule the Veteran for an evaluation. Because of this initiative, the Certified Prosthetists Orthotist (CPO) will be able to see any patient with prosthetic, orthotic, and pedorthic needs, including artificial limbs, bracing, and footwear.

The clinic also offers remote visits with healthcare providers to make getting top-notch healthcare even easier for those who have a hard time moving around. These telehealth visits cover various specialties including mental health, retinal care, general surgery follow-up, dermatology, rehabilitation, primary care, audiology, speech, neurology, sleep medicine, prosthetics, physical therapy, occupational therapy, kinesiotherapy, and transplant follow-up. The clinic has also introduced Technology-Based Eye Care Services (TECS) to address the increased likelihood of eye disorders in Veterans of the Vietnam, Korean, or early wars. Additionally, the presence of Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA) staff on-site allows the clinic to provide direct support to Veterans in signing up for benefits.
